Everyday Crosses

In this week's Gospel, Jesus is nearing the end of his journeys with his disciples. Soon after these events, he will turn towards Jerusalem to face his Passion. He is beginning to pull his Apostles aside for intimate moments, revealing more deeply his heart, teachings, and mission on earth.

The Apostles have spent almost three years with Jesus, but here it is evident that they still don't fully know him. It can be challenging to watch them misunderstand Jesus so many times, but we can relate to them more than we realize. Because Jesus is God, there will always be things about him that we cannot fully understand because our minds are finite. Moreover, the ways of God are not like our ways. His kingdom, his mission, and his promises aren't what we expect.

The logic of the Gospel is the logic of God, not of humans. Today, Jesus wants to pull us aside for an intimate moment to reveal his heart more deeply to us and to teach us his logic that will lead to our true joy, just as he did for his Apostles.

First Reading Reflection Wisdom 2:12, 17-20

It may seem odd to read a quote from the wicked, or ungodly men in the Book of Wisdom. In the ancient world, the wise men understood the reason behind

things and ordered all things in their lives rightly, or prudently. Knowledge of the highest or first cause would bring the greatest wisdom. Consider that God is the First Cause of all things and that knowing more about God would necessarily mean understanding more about everything that he has created. In short, the religious person who strives to know more about the God he or she loves will generally be the wisest. So, it is that the saints are often revered as much for their wisdom as their goodness. To be



good, however, one must also understand the absence of goodness—wickedness—in order to avoid that which is wicked.

As the "just one" in the book of Wisdom is associated with Jesus, so also "the wicked" are often associated with those who oppose Jesus's ministry. Compare our reading this week with those who revile him at the foot of the Cross in Matthew 27:39-44. The Church sees the Passion of Jesus as fulfilling the poor treatment of the "just one" by "the wicked" as described here in the book of Wisdom. This book is worth a thorough reading for its faith-

filled assertion of the final victory of good over evil and life over death.

Second Reading

Reflection

James 3:16—4:3

In the second reading, Saint James addresses the question of why there is so little peace in the world. Peace, he tells us, is not found in the pursuit of what the world offers us, but in heavenly things. It is found in "wisdom

from above." The world often talks about discovering peace, but no one can deny that we still live in a world filled with turmoil and chaos; the evidence is too obvious and too immediate to deny. We live in a world that is marked by conflict. There is conflict in global matters, at the national level, and even in local communities between friends and families. Somehow, our pursuit of peace has fallen far short of the mark.

This lack of peace, as history shows us, is rooted in man's desire for what he does not have. In itself, this desire is not bad. We should be motivated by the desire to receive those things that God has waiting for us. Nevertheless, we place things such as material goods, sensual satisfaction, and recognition before God. Because temporal things can never fully satisfy us, we grow frustrated and become jealous of one another, which leads us into open conflict.

As Christians, we see things differently. The wisdom of God is timeless. All peace begins within the soul of the individual person, because she is given entirely to the service of God. Peace cannot begin anywhere else. Peace of soul, as spoken of by St. James, is the only peace that can ultimately bring lasting peace. God's ways are not our ways. If we truly desire peace of soul, we should surrender our desires to God and look for his peace, not the peace of the world.

Gospel Reading Reflection Mark 9:30–37

Even though Jesus just told the disciples that he is going to the sacred city of Jerusalem to suffer ridicule and death, they choose to spend the journey talking about which among them is the greatest. They are not thinking with the mind of the Lord. Why do the disciples fail to realize the nature of the journey to Jerusalem and the cross? Once we lose sight of the destination or goal of our journey, we usually get lost. This

is what happened to the disciples spiritually. As they traveled to Jerusalem, they were thinking of power, namely, those who had the most importance among themselves. We, like the disciples, can lose sight of the real spiritual significance of life and the Father's call for us, if we do not remain in the presence of Jesus as we journey toward the heavenly Jerusalem. The disciples teach us that we must stay with Jesus if we want to be with him in Heaven.

Join the Discussion

The logic of the Gospel includes the Cross. If God were only concerned with our present life, then allowing suffering in our lives would not make sense. But God is fundamentally concerned about our eternal life! Our way to heaven is through Jesus Christ, by uniting with him in his suffering and death so that we can rejoice with him in his Resurrection and ours.

As you watch the short video on StMichael.FORMED.org, reflect on how you can embrace the Cross in your daily life. Share your an-

swers to the following questions with a family member or friend or in the online St Michael Discussion group found at StMichael.FORMED.org

What are some of the differences between the kingdoms of this world and the kingdom of God?

How would you describe the logic of the Gospel based on the readings today and your other knowledge of Scripture?

Who are the people you encounter in your everyday life? How can you think of these people as an integral part of your growth in holiness? Loving them will require you to pick up your crosses and grow in virtue.

What are some crosses you have right now that you could begin to carry out of love for those in your daily life?

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

Instead of making strategic plans to overthrow the Romans and bestow wealth on his disciples, Jesus tells them that he will suffer and die, and that they must become the servants of all.

Let's return to the Gospel for this week. Take the word that comes to mind and reflect on what it means to you personally. For example, the phrase, "They were afraid to ask him," might have stuck out to you. Ask yourself what this means in your own life. Is Jesus trying to calm your fears about approaching

him, inviting you to come to know him more deeply and to let him help you carry your cross?

RESOLUTION

St Therese of Lisieux lived with a particularly tiresome and notoriously difficult elderly nun. Instead of defending herself against her, ignoring her, or even just trying to mind her own business, Therese went out of her way to take care of this nun. Because she was dedicated to God in contemplative prayer, she was able to recognize that she was serving God by showing compassion to the sisters around her.

Therese said that she had a very real, supernatural experience of God loving through her actions when she knew she was incapable of loving this difficult nun on her own. Instead of mustering up the strength in herself, or not even trying out of fear, she remained weak and little, relying on God's love to work through her for her sister.

What feels impossible to us because of our weakness is always possible with God. Take a moment and ask the Holy Spirit to inspire you to be compassionate toward one particular person this week. Ask for the grace to change your disposition or attitude toward them.



TRADICIONES DE NUESTRA FE

Últimamente, hay mucho interés en los ángeles y sobre todo en los arcángeles. Según el catecismo católico, los ángeles existen para glorificar y servir a Dios y para ayudar con el plan salvífico de Jesucristo, cooperando con nuestras buenas obras. Lamentablemente muchos, en especial los de la New Age, se interesan sólo en los ángeles con el fin de utilizarlos en lugar de dejarse guiar por ellos.

La Tradición ha designado una jerarquía de 9 rangos entre los seres espirituales. Los serafines son los primeros y más cercanos a Dios y los ángeles son los últimos y más cercanos a la humanidad. En esta jerarquía, los arcángeles son los penúltimos en poder, aunque sí son los más buscados por su responsabilidad de cuidar los cuatro puntos cardinales de la creación. Según la tradición hebrea, hay siete arcángeles (Tobías 12:15), de los cuales las Sagradas Escrituras sólo mencionan tres por nombre, Miguel (¿Quién como Dios?), Gabriel (hombre de Dios) y Rafael (Dios sana). De estos, Miguel parece ser el más popular gracias a su poder contra el mal.

CÓMO TRATAMOS AL MENSAJERO

No debemos precipitarnos a definir quiénes son "los malvados" y quiénes (es decir nosotros) son los justos. Tendemos a clasificar rápidamente a los demás como malos, porque solemos considerarnos buenas personas. No nos gusta que una voz profética nos critique con malas noticias sobre nuestro propio comportamiento. No nos gusta que nos reprochen que hemos transgredido la ley ni que nos acusen de no haber actuado acorde a nuestra formación.

Puede que condenemos e insultemos a quienes nos enfrentan a estas verdades sobre nosotros mismos, pero si fuéramos realmente buenos, les agradeceríamos por ayudarnos a permanecer en el camino correcto. Éste es el trato que le dieron a los profetas y el trato que le dieron a Jesús. ¿Es éste también el trato que les damos a las personas cuyos mensajes no nos gustan?
