# Unpack Today's Mass Readings




## Summary

Last week we talked about the gift of faith and how even the smallest amount of faith could move mountains. This week our Scripture readings focus on gratitude.

We've all heard the saying "Have an attitude of gratitude." For Christians, this is more than a greeting card saying; it is a basic command of Christian life. The theme of gratitude underlies this week's Gospel reading that tells of ten lepers who were healed by Jesus. In the reading, ten lepers earnestly long for healing since leprosy was one of the great curses of their time, causing those who suffered from the disease to live apart from family and friends. All ten turned to Jesus in faith with their request. However, after they are healed, only one of the ten returns to thank him for answering their prayer.

While Jesus makes it clear that it was the man's faith that healed him, the story has another lesson as well. Although we must begin our prayer requests in faith, they should end in gratitude. All too often, we are quick to make requests, but slow to return in thankful prayer. Like the nine lepers who did not come back, we neglect to express our thanks to God when our prayers are answered. However, thankfulness is

a hallmark of a true disciple. As 1 Thessalonians 5:18 says, "In all circumstances give thanks, for this is the will of God for you in Christ Jesus." Meister Eckhart, a medieval mystic, once said, "If the only prayer you ever say in your entire life is thank you, it will be enough." How often do you remember to say "thank you" to God?



## Unpack the First Reading 2 Kings 5:14-17

There are sacramental resonances, including Baptism, found in this story. The seven washings is another. In Hebrew, "seven" means completeness and is virtually synonymous with the covenant, owing to the importance of the Sabbath or seventh day. In our seven sacramental celebrations we receive faith in the one God, as did Naaman, and the abundance of divine life of grace.

Naaman still holds to the ancient idea that gods are resident in particular places and invoked by

the people of that place for their protection. That's why he requests some earth to carry with him back to Damascus. He may have had in mind erecting an altar to Yahweh on the earth brought from the Promised Land and so constructing for himself a little island of Israel in Syria. Christ reveals that God's covenantal favor extends to every person of every nation, that he's the one God of all. How ironic it is that Naaman is used by us as a symbol of the universal sovereignty of God and yet he still believes that he must take Israel with him to Syria if he is to worship God there.

## Unpack the Second Reading 2 Timothy 2:8-13

The real reason that Paul and millions like him have been willing to exert themselves to the point of death is found in two simple lines in our reading. The first is, "Remember Jesus Christ, raised from the dead" was "a descendant of David." Jesus is the messianic heir of the eternal throne promised to David and, as proof of that, he rose from the dead. That terse statement contains the whole of the Gospel. The second simple line explains Paul's willingness to undergo unbelievable trials, "I bear with everything for the sake of those who are chosen." He's not suffering for his own reward, although that's promised, but that others "may obtain the salvation that is in

Christ Jesus together with eternal glory.”

The whole paradigm of the Christian life is contained in those two short phrases. Anything necessary, including loss of life, is worth the salvation of even one soul. Each of the chosen of God is loved so completely by Christ that he was willing to die for that one. His love for us and others calls forth a response of love in us. It comes down to the great commandment—love of God and neighbor.

### Unpack the Gospel Luke 17:11-19

It's important to note that this episode is set on the border between Galilee and Samaria, both of which were avoided by pious Jews. The fact that Jesus is skirting Samaria may indicate that his destination, Jerusalem, makes him unwelcome even by the outsiders in Samaria. So the location itself suggests that Jesus is addressing the needs of covenant outsiders and as an outsider himself.

The “distance” between Jesus and the lepers is, like the setting of the story, more than a simple question of geography. Leprosy didn’t simply impose a physical distance upon its victims but a religious one as well. Leprosy left one unable to participate in Jewish ritual practices and was considered symbolic of the ravages of sin. Jesus invites the ten lepers back into the covenant family of Israel and in so doing, was invoking Levitical Law which required that someone cured of leprosy present himself to the priest for examination. The one leper who returned to thank Jesus was a Samaritan—the outcast among the leprous outcasts. He receives the faith that brings him into communion with Jesus and the new covenant community. Jesus declares to him, “your faith has been your salvation.” Ironically, it’s the ultimate outsider who’s received by Jesus into the kingdom.

### Reflect & Discuss

Please watch the short Opening the Word video. Then reflect and discuss these questions with a friend:

One of the themes of this week’s Gospel is our response to answered prayer. What are some prayers that have been answered in your life?

What are some of the characteristics shared by the ten lepers? From the details in the passage, describe the one leper who returned to thank Jesus.

Leprosy was one of the biggest social stigmas of Jesus’ time. Lepers were not allowed to live in society, but had to live apart. They could not participate in the worship of God in the Temple, as they were unclean; they had to announce their presence by shouting, “unclean, unclean!”

What are some examples of modern-day lepers? How do our fears cause us to treat certain people or groups of people without the dignity that they deserve? What does Jesus’ behavior teach us?

# Fr Carl's Message of the Week



## Safeguarding and Respecting Life: A Sacred Calling and Mission

My Dear Parish Family,

Let us continue our October reflection on the beauty and sacredness of human life. In his 1995 encyclical letter *The Gospel of Life* (*Evangelium Vitae*), Pope John Paul II said:

"We are very much in danger of giving into a 'culture of death.' Modern debates on abortion and euthanasia are a symptom and leading edge of something more profound and insidious -- an entire view of the world that will lead us to forsake our ideals of human dignity and equality and 'revert to a state of barbarism'. " (EV 14)

In our culture today, human life is cheap. Babies are aborted. Unborn human embryos are "reduced" in the process of in vitro fertilization. The elderly, sick and dying are euthanized. Countless people are human trafficked across the globe. Humans are being treated as objects of pleasure, livelihood or pieces of trash to be discarded. So many people have been deprived of their human dignity, due to poverty, war, violence, materialism and hedonism. Or worse, by simply not caring. The culture of death that is pervasive in our world now is against natural law and against what God divinely willed for human beings. No one has a God-given right to terminate human life. No one must treat people like objects.

As a Church, we also have our share in this problem due to the

horrible sexual scandals of clergy. However, even amid this darkness, we are called even more to the light of holiness. We must strive evermore to protect life and treat people with the utmost respect from conception until natural death. Our stance in proclaiming the truth on life, its dignity and its value, must remain constant.

Let us make a living and active statement that our parish is pro-life.

St Pope John Paul II reminds us: "... How much more can we say as people of faith! To us, life is not just a "given" -- it is our first and most basic gift, from a Creator who loves us with an unsurpassable love. What, then, is human life in this vision? It is, in the Holy Father's words, "As manifestation of God in the world, a sign of his presence, a trace of his glory... in man there shines forth a reflection of God himself." (EV 34)

Catechism of the Catholic Church also reminds of our Catholic position (#2258):

"You have heard that it was said to the men of old, 'You shall not kill: and whoever kills shall be lia-

ble to judgement.' But I say to you that everyone who is angry with his brother shall be liable to judgement. 'Human life is sacred because from its beginning it involves the creative action of God and it remains forever in a special relationship with the Creator, who is its sole end. God alone is the Lord of life from its beginning until its end: no one can under any circumstance claim for himself the right directly to destroy an innocent human being."

All of us are made in the image and likeness of God. It is a dignity that cannot be diminished and therefore must be protected, preserved, and always respected at all cost and all times. But, how? We can pray. We can inform our conscience. We can study the issue. We can attend rallies. We can vote wisely in alliance with our Catholic faith. We can support pro-life efforts. We can start here in our own parish. Let us make a living and active statement that our parish is pro-life.

I would like to end my reflection with the Word of God from the Book of Deuteronomy 30:19.

"I call heaven and earth to witness against you today, that I have set before you life and death, the blessing and the curse. So, choose life in order that you may live, you and your descendants".



# Mensaje de la semana del Padre Carl



## Salvaguardar y respetar la vida: un llamado y una misión sagrada

Mi querida familia parroquial,

Continuemos nuestra reflexión de octubre sobre la belleza y lo sagrado de la vida humana. En su carta encíclica de 1995 El Evangelio de la Vida (Evangelium Vitae), el Papa Juan Pablo II dijo:

"Estamos en grave peligro de ceder ante una 'cultura de la muerte'. Los debates modernos sobre el aborto y la eutanasia son un síntoma y una vanguardia de algo más profundo e insidioso: una visión completa del mundo que nos llevará a abandonar nuestros ideales de dignidad humana e igualdad y 'volver a un estado de barbarie' ".  
(EV 14)

En nuestra cultura actual, la vida humana es barata. Los bebés son abortados. Los embriones humanos no nacidos se "reducen" en el proceso de fertilización in vitro. Los ancianos, enfermos y moribundos son sacrificados. Innumerables personas son víctimas de los traficantes de personas en todo el mundo. Los humanos están siendo tratados como objetos de placer, medios de vida o pedazos de basura para ser descartados. Muchas personas se han visto privadas de su dignidad humana, debido a la pobreza, la guerra, la violencia, el materialismo y el hedonismo. O peor, simplemente sin preocuparse. La cultura de la muerte que está presente en nuestro mundo ahora está en contra de la ley natural y en contra de lo que Dios divinamente ha querido para los seres humanos. Nadie tiene el derecho otorgado por Dios de ter-

minar con la vida humana. Nadie debe tratar a las personas como objetos.

Como Iglesia, también tenemos nuestra parte en este problema debido a los horribles escándalos sexuales del clero. Sin embargo, incluso en medio de esta oscuridad, somos llamados aún más a la luz de la santidad. Debemos esforzarnos cada vez más para proteger la vida y tratar a las personas con el mayor respeto desde la concepción hasta la muerte natural. Nuestra postura al proclamar la verdad sobre la vida, su dignidad y su valor, debe permanecer constante. San Juan Pablo II nos recuerda:

"... ¡Cuánto más podemos decir como personas de fe! Para nosotros, la vida no es solo un "regalo", es nuestro primer y más básico regalo, de un Creador que nos ama con un amor inmensurable.

¿Qué es, entonces, la vida humana en esta visión? Es, en palabras del Santo Padre, "Como manifestación de Dios en el mundo, un signo de su presencia, un rastro de su gloria ... en el hombre brilla un reflejo de Dios mismo". (EV 34)

El Catecismo de la Iglesia Católica también recuerda nuestra posición católica (# 2258):

"Has oído que se dijo a los hombres de la antigüedad: 'No matarás; y el que mata será juzgado'. Pero te digo que todos los que estén enojados con su hermano serán juzgados. 'La vida humana es sagrada porque desde su inicio involucra la acción creativa de Dios y permanece para siempre en

una relación especial con el Creador, quien es su único fin. Solo Dios es el Señor de la vida desde el principio hasta el final: nadie, bajo ninguna circunstancia, puede reclamar por sí mismo el derecho de destruir directamente a un ser humano inocente".

Todos nosotros estamos hechos a imagen y semejanza de Dios. Es una dignidad que no puede disminuirse y, por lo tanto, debe protegerse, preservarse y respetarse siempre a toda costa y en todo momento. ¿Pero cómo? Podemos rezar. Podemos informar a nuestra conciencia. Podemos estudiar el tema. Podemos asistir a manifestaciones. Podemos votar sabiamente en alianza con nuestra fe católica. Podemos apoyar los esfuerzos pro-vida. Podemos comenzar aquí en nuestra propia parroquia. Hagamos una declaración viva y activa de que nuestra parroquia es pro-vida.

Me gustaría terminar mi reflexión con la Palabra de Dios del Libro de Deuteronomio 30:19.

"Llamo al cielo y a la tierra para testificar contra ti hoy, que he puesto ante ti la vida y la muerte, la bendición y la maldición. Por lo tanto, elige la vida para que puedas vivir, tú y tus descendientes".

Que Dios los bendiga a ustedes y a sus familias.
