Reach Out and Embrace the Kingdom

In our Gospel reading today, Jesus encounters a sincere scribe, unlike the other Pharisees, Herodians, and Sadducees, who continually attempted to trick him and destroy his words. Because of his sincerity, Jesus offers great hope to this scribe by telling him that he is not far from the Kingdom of God.

We can relate both to the sincere scribe and to those who doubted in Jesus. There are times when we have doubted in God's love for us, and there are times when we have truly trusted in him. We must learn to trust him more than we doubt, so that we are not far from the Kingdom of God.

The scribe doesn't approach Jesus with skepticism, but rather with an open heart. He is sincerely seeking to know Jesus's identity. This humility and simplicity enables Jesus to reveal himself to this one scribe and draw so near to him that Jesus can tell him, "You are not far from the kingdom of God."

First Reading Reflection Deuteronomy 6:2–6

Because of the busyness of our lives, it can sometimes be difficult to keep God at the center. Our lives are typically organized around jobs, money, children, and other important commitments, given the secularity of our culture. This reading from Deuteronomy suggests a different organizing principle for our

lives, one that calls us to love God completely. In the Catholic tradition, we refer to this central virtue of loving God as *caritas*, which means charity. All the virtues of a Christian originate with *caritas*, or love of God. Deuteronomy here insists on the interior dimension of love: we are to love God with all our heart (*levav*) and with all our soul (*nephesh*). This interior orientation toward God in love leads to action with our



bodily strength (*me'od*). This commandment not only unites the whole law, but it unites the whole of our lives in God. Our work, our family lives, our friendships, and our duties are all brought together by *caritas*—by love for God. Saint Paul explains this concept: "Whatever you do, do from the heart, as for the Lord and not for others" (Colossians 3:23). Moses promises the people that if they obey this law, they can look forward to the blessings of long life, happy circumstances, and many children in the Promised Land. We too can anticipate eternal life, sharing in God's happiness in the Promised Land of Heaven if we take to heart his central commandment of the law: to love God.

Second Reading Reflection Hebrews 7:23–28

In this second reading, we find three arguments for the superiority of the New Covenant over the Old Covenant, centered primarily on the priesthood. First, the Old Covenant had many priests, while the New Covenant has only one eternal High Priest. Second, under the Old Covenant, many repetitious sacrifices were needed, while under the New Covenant there is only one sacrifice "once for all" (v. 27). Lastly, weakness and sinfulness of the Old Covenant priests fall short of the high priest of the New Covenant, who is "holy, innocent, undefiled" (v. 26).

Jesus's status as the Eternal High Priest means, "He is always able to save those who approach God through him" (v. 25). Our future, our hope for eternal life, rests on Jesus's priesthood. It is through the supreme sacrifice that he makes on the altar of the Cross as both priest and sacrificial victim, such that we come to share in his inheritance. It is essential for us to reflect on the fact that our God loved us so much that he sent his only Son as a priest to offer himself as a sacrifice for us. Our very salvation depends on it.

Gospel Reflection Mark 12: 28–34

Normally, Jesus's conversations with the prevailing religious authorities are adversarial, but in

today's Gospel, a scribe approaches Jesus in all sincerity to discover whether he has an accurate grasp on the Law of God. Jesus responds to his question about the Greatest Commandment by referring to the schema of Deuteronomy 6, which was our First Reading. Love of God is the center of the Law, yet Jesus goes one step further, to say that the Greatest Commandment is twofold, to include love of neighbor, a law that he quotes from Leviticus 19:18. All of the commandments can be summarized under these two headings: love of God and love of neighbor. Jesus adds that to love God in neighbor "is worth more than all the burnt offerings and sacrifices" (v. 33). Jesus approves of his reply, but then subtly challenges him, "You are not far from the kingdom of God" (v. 34). Thus, in this Gospel passage, we are given the Greatest Commandment, which should be the source of our actions and meditations.

Digging Deeper The Common Priesthood

Baptism is the foundation of our whole life as a Christian, but sadly many Catholics do not know the effects of Baptism and thereby cannot fully actualize them.

One such gift is that we are incorporated into Jesus's royal priesthood. While only a Catholic priest can exercise the ministerial priesthood, all who are baptized share in the common priesthood of Jesus. Burnt offerings and sacrifices are no longer required because Jesus, the eternal High Priest, offered himself as sacrifice once and for all. Thus, through our participation in Jesus's priesthood we are able to offer his priestly sacrifice at the Cross back to the Father for ourselves and for the whole world. All sacrifices we make now are made redemptive when we unite them with Jesus's sacrifice on the Cross.

Discussion Questions


When we start talking about evangelization, we can become nervous and overwhelmed. We think of people who spread the

faith as the ones who know it very well and are ready for any question, but everyone is called to be a true disciple, not only theologians, priests, and religious.

Preaching the Gospel should always flow from this foundation of fulfilling the call to love God and neighbor. It becomes easier to evangelize when we know that we are sharing the Gospel out of love for God and our neighbors, and not because we are trying to make ourselves look good. Rather than focusing on answering apologetic questions perfectly, we are focused on sharing the saving Gospel of Jesus Christ.

In order to fulfill the Great Commission to preach the Gospel, do you think you need to know more about Jesus and the Catholic Church first?



In the Gospel for this week, we see firsthand the peace and simplicity that flows from entering into relationship with Jesus. When we are able to approach him with humility and not skepticism, then Jesus is able to reveal his deepest commandments to us—that we are made to love God and neighbor.

PRAYER

Return to the Gospel for this week. Here, Jesus lays out the two-fold commandment of love for those who have ears to hear. We are called both to love God above all things and to love our neighbor with the love of Christ.

Take the word that comes to mind and reflect on what it means to you personally. For example, the phrase “The Lord our God is Lord alone!” might have stuck out to you. Ask yourself what this means in your own life. Is the Lord asking you to remove an idol from your life, which is preventing you from worshipping him alone?

RESOLUTION

In his book *Interior Freedom*, Fr. Jacques Philippe says, “Lacking hope, we don’t really believe God can make us happy, and so we construct our happiness out of covetousness and lust. We don’t wait to find the fullness of our existence in God, and so we shape an artificial identity grounded in pride. Or else—the most common condition among people of good will—we would like to love and be generous in loving and giving ourselves, but we are held back by fears, hesitations, and worries. Lack of trust in what God’s grace can do in our lives, and what we can do with his help, leads to a shrinkage of the heart, a lessening of charity. But, as St. Thérèse of Lisieux said, trust leads to love.”

The most remarkable teaching that our Lord gave to St. Faustina about the Sacrament of Reconciliation is found in her Diary entry 1448. Jesus said to her:

"Write, speak of My mercy. Tell souls where they are to look for solace, that is, in the Tribunal of Mercy [the Sacrament of Reconciliation]. There the greatest miracles take place [and] are incessantly repeated. To avail oneself of this miracle, it is not necessary to go on a great pilgrimage, or to carry out some external ceremony; it suffices to come with faith to the feet of My representative and to reveal to Him one's misery, and the miracle of Divine Mercy will be fully demonstrated. Were souls like a decaying corpse so that from a human standpoint there would be no [hope of] restoration and everything would already be lost, it is not so with God. The miracle of Divine Mercy restores that soul in full."

In Ancient times, Advent was considered a "Little Lent" and a time to experience Divine Mercy. It has a penitential dimension due to our desire to purify our hearts and lives as we recall our Lord's birth - His first coming - and anticipate

His second coming in glory. Thus, in anticipation of the start of the new liturgical year, Advent and Christmas, we will offer three dates to choose from to celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation as a parish for adults, families and youth. Why three days? This unique approach gives a big parish like ours the opportunity to prepare for Advent early. *Please look at your calendar now and save one of these Mondays at 6:30 pm in the Church: November 5, November 12, or November 19.*

We have invited priests from neighboring parishes who have served the parish before and with whom you are familiar.

General Conditions

A plenary indulgence can be gained only once a day. In order to obtain it, the faithful must, in addition to being in the state of grace:

1. have the interior disposition of complete detachment from sin, even venial sin.
2. have sacramentally confessed their sins.
3. receive the Holy Eucharist.
4. pray for the intentions of the Pope.

If only some of the conditions have been met, the indulgence is partial.



Indulgence Obtainable November 1-8

"An indulgence is a remission before God of the temporal punishment due to sins whose guilt has already been forgiven, which the faithful Christian who is duly disposed gains under certain prescribed conditions through the action of the Church which, as the minister of redemption, dispenses and applies with authority the treasury of the satisfactions of Christ and the saints". (CCC 1471)

Grant #29.1.1: For the Souls in Purgatory

A plenary indulgence, applicable only to the souls in purgatory, is granted each and every day from Nov 1 to Nov 8, who devoutly visit a cemetery and there pray, if only mentally, for the departed.

Grant #29.1.2: All Souls' Day, November 2

A plenary indulgence is granted the faithful who, on All Souls' Day (or according to the judgment of the bishop, on the Sunday preceding or following it, or on the solemnity of All Saints), devoutly visits a church or an oratory and recites an Our Father and the Creed.


Thanks from St Vincent de Paul Society

La enseñanza más notable que nuestro Señor le dio a Santa Faustina sobre el Sacramento de la Reconciliación se encuentra en la entrada 1448 de su diario. Jesús le dijo:

"Escribe, habla de Mi misericordia. Dígale a las almas dónde deben buscar consuelo, o sea, en el Tribunal de la Misericordia [el Sacramento de la Reconciliación]. Allí se suceden los milagros más grandes [y] se repiten incesantemente. Para recibir este milagro, no es necesario ir en una gran peregrinación, o llevar a cabo alguna ceremonia externa, es suficiente ir con fe a los pies de mi Representante y revelarle las penas, y el milagro de la Divina Misericordia será totalmente demostrado. Si las almas fueran como un cadáver en descomposición de modo que, desde un punto de vista humano, no habría [esperanza de] restauración y todo ya estaría perdido, no es así con Dios. El milagro de la Divina Misericordia restaura esa alma por completo".

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
