

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STUDY

We tend to believe good times will last forever. (Just look at what happened before the Great Recession of 2008.) While it's nice to be optimistic in that respect, we tend to worry that the bad times will last forever as well. The truth is that life is a series of contrasts—mountaintop experiences followed by deep valleys.

This week's Gospel, about the Transfiguration, clearly shows us that we all live amid con-

trasts. The disciples are so excited by what they have witnessed that they want to build tents to commemorate the event, and then, almost immediately, they are nearly paralyzed by fear. The same is true for us, especially when it comes to our faith. At times we have bright

moments when all seems so clear and obvious, and then we begin to experience doubts and uncertainty. Sometimes it even seems as if God himself has withdrawn from us.

We must not be surprised by these contrasting experiences, but instead we should use this week's reading as preparation for what we will do when the contrasts occur. For us, as for Abraham in the first reading, the disciples, and all who have gone before us in faith, it is only when we listen attentively to God's beloved Son that we will have the courage and grace to deal with all that life is sure to hand us.

First Reading Reflection Genesis 12:1–4a

This reading for the Second Sunday of Lent continues our tour of the peaks of salvation history. One could say that this passage represents God's mission statement. The general intent expressed is to provide Abraham—and through him, "all the communities of the earth"—with a land, blessing, and a great name. All of this depends, of course, on his generating an



heir. Without the birth of Isaac, there could be no nation, land, blessing, or the passing on of his name.

Abraham does receive these promises. That we're still reading about Abraham four thousand years after the events recounted here is largely due to the fact that these promises made to him in Genesis 12 were fulfilled. Our faith is that they were fulfilled in a far more fantastic way than Abraham could've ever imagined. The land promised has been extended, by the mission of the Church received from Christ, to include the whole world. The blessing is given to all who come to her

sacraments. The name is that of Jesus, the only name under heaven by which we're saved.

Second Reading Reflection 2 Timothy 1:8b–10

Hardship is something we naturally seek to avoid, but St. Paul has given us some reason for embracing the thing our natural inclinations reject. God has saved us, he says, "and called us to a holy life." To be holy is to

do what we see Christ doing. If he suffered for the sake of the Gospel, then so should we. The salvation which comes to us as a consequence of the suffering of Christ is the fruit of the Father's plan, which included (even required) suffering. In other words, our hard-

ship is part of the plan of our salvation, won by Christ through suffering and appropriated by us through our share of his suffering in and for the Body of Christ—the Church. What was unredeemed before Christ has become a tool in the hand of God to shape us in conformity with his plan for the kingdom.

In this way, he has "destroyed death and brought life and immortality to light through the gospel." One of the revolutions that the Gospel brings about is this reversal of fortunes in which the greatest misfortunes—even death itself—is made an instrument of eternal life.

Gospel Reflection Matthew 17:1-9

This Gospel reading represents a confluence of themes from the Old Testament, Mt. Tabor has been spoken of as a second Mt. Sinai—where the Ten Commandments and the ceremonial law of the Old Covenant were received. This fits nicely into Matthew's theme of Jesus as the new Moses. Several elements in this narrative also suggest a connection with the Jewish Feast of Booths (Sukkot). It's significant that Jesus' coming to Mt. Tabor also results in a manifestation of God's glory and the presence of a cloud, both of which are associated with the Feast of Booths. Jesus is thereby simultaneously portrayed as the new Law, the new manifestation of God, and the new Temple: all of which were elements of importance in the Jewish celebration of the Feast of Booths. It's sometimes overlooked that Moses and Elijah were the only two figures in the Old Testament who spoke directly with God, both on Mt. Horeb (another name for Mt. Sinai). If Tabor is intended to represent a new Sinai, then we ought to consider the possibility that Matthew is showing us that

Jesus is more than simply a new Moses or Elijah; he's also the God who spoke to Moses and Elijah on Mt. Horeb—as he's now shown doing on Mt. Tabor.

Reflection from JaNet Hancock

The following reflection was distributed to all members of the National Association of Pastoral Musicians (NPM) for the second Sunday of Lent by our director of Music, JaNet Hancock:

"This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased; listen to him." Matthew 17:5

Each year on the 2nd Sunday of Lent, we hear the Gospel of the Transfiguration (also proclaimed on the Feast of the Transfiguration). This has been both a curiosity and a challenge for me, sparking my curiosity as to why the Church would want us to hear this Gospel so often. And challenging me to genuinely hear the words of Jesus, to recognize and respond to his voice.

I find myself relating to Peter. I have been to the mountaintop and heard his voice. But, did I really hear? Was I truly changed? Or like Peter, am I impulsive and impatient? easily distracted? preoccupied with my own agendas?

This Gospel comforts me when I am aware of my human failings as both a faithful Catholic and parish musician. The yearly repetition is a reminder to me that even though I struggle to hear his voice, Jesus still reaches out to me, guiding me to him. To quote today's Psalm – "May your kindness, O Lord, be upon us who have put our hope in you."

FROM FR CARL

Dear St Michael Family,

As we focus on prayer in this season of Lent, allow me to share the types of prayer in the tradition of the Church.

Prayer, St. John Damascene wrote, "is the raising of one's mind and heart to God or the requesting of good things from God." At an even more basic level, a prayer is a form of communication, a way of talking to God or to the saints, just as we talk to family or friends.

As the Catechism of the Catholic Church notes, however, not all prayers are the same. In Paragraphs 2626-2643, the Catechism describes five basic types of prayer. Here are brief descriptions of each type of prayer, with examples of each.

1. Adoration and Worship In prayers of adoration or worship, we exalt the greatness of God, and we acknowledge our dependence on Him in all things.

The Mass and the other liturgies of the Church are full of prayers of adoration or worship, such as the Gloria (the Glory to God).

2. Petition

Outside of the Mass, prayers of petition are the type of prayer with which we are most familiar. In them, we ask God for things we need—primarily spiritual needs, but physical ones as well. Our prayers of petition should always include a statement of our willingness to accept God's Will, whether He directly answers God for what He is. As the Cateour prayer or not.

Intercession

Prayers of intercession – praying for others – is another form of petition, but they are important enough to be considered their own type of prayer. As the Catechism of the Catholic Church notes (# 2634), "Intercession is a prayer of petition which leads us to pray as Jesus did." In a prayer of intercession, we're not concerned with our needs but with the needs of others.

4. Thanksgiving

Perhaps the most neglected type of prayer is a prayer of thanksgiving. While praying "Grace" before meals is a good example of a prayer of thanksgiving, we should get into the habit of thanking God throughout the day for all the good things that happen to us and others. Consider including the Grace After Meals prayer as an excellent practice.

5. Praise

Prayers of praise acknowledge chism of the Catholic Church (# 2639) notes, praise "lauds God for his own sake and gives him glory, quite beyond what he does, but simply because HE IS. It shares in the blessed happiness of the pure of heart who love God in faith before seeing him in glory." The Psalms are perhaps the best-known example of prayers of praise.

ESPAÑOL

Querida familia de San Miguel,

Mientras nos concentramos en la oración en esta temporada de Cuaresma, deseo compartir los tipos de oración en la tradición de la Iglesia.

La oración, escribió San Juan Damasceno, "es elevar la mente v el corazón de uno a Dios o pedirle cosas buenas a Dios". En un nivel aún más básico, la oración es una forma de comunicación, una forma de hablar con Dios o con los santos, tal como hablamos con familiares o amigos.

Como señala el Catecismo de la Iglesia Católica, sin embargo, no todas las oraciones son iguales. En los párrafos 2626-2643, el Catecismo describe cinco tipos básicos de oración. Aquí hay breves descripciones de cada tipo de oración, con ejemplos de cada una.

1. Adoración

En las oraciones de adoración exaltamos la grandeza de Dios y reconocemos nuestra dependencia de Él en todas las cosas. La misa y las otras liturgias de la Iglesia están llenas de oraciones de 4. Acción de gracias adoración, como el Gloria (la Gloria a Dios).

2. Petición

Fuera de la misa. las oraciones de petición son el tipo de oración con el que estamos más familiarizados. En ellos, le pedimos a Dios las cosas que necesitamos, principalmente necesidades espirituales, pero también físicas. Nuestras oraciones de petición siempre deben incluir una declaración de nuestra voluntad de aceptar la Voluntad de Dios, va sea que Él responda directamente a nuestra oración o no.

3. Intercesión

Las oraciones de intercesión, orar por los demás, es otra forma de petición, pero son suficientemente importantes como para ser consideradas dentro de su propio tipo de oración. Como señala el Catecismo de la Iglesia Católica (# 2634), "La intercesión es una oración de petición que nos lleva a orar como lo hizo Jesús". En una oración de intercesión, no nos interesan nuestras necesidades, sino las necesidades de los demás.

Quizás el tipo de oración más descuidado es la oración de acción de gracias. Si bien rezar "Gracias" antes de las comidas es un buen ejemplo de una oración de acción de gracias, debemos acostumbrarnos a agradecer a Dios durante todo el día por todas las cosas buenas que nos suceden a nosotros y a los demás. Considere incluir la oración de gracias después de las comidas como una práctica excelente.

5. Alabanza

Las oraciones de alabanza reconocen a Dios por lo que es. Como señala el Catecismo de la Iglesia Católica (# 2639), el elogio "alaba a Dios por su propio bien y le da gloria, más allá de lo que hace, pero simplemente porque EL ES. Comparte la bendita felicidad del puro de corazón que ama a Dios con fe antes de verlo en gloria ". Los Salmos son quizás el ejemplo más conocido de oraciones de alabanza.

Dios lo bendiga a usted y a su familia.
