GOSPEL REFLECTIONS



DISCOVER RESURRECTION FAITH

Even Thomas struggles to remove his boulder! Being very pragmatic and determined, he wants to see the risen Christ for himself! Thomas's boulder is heavy with mistrust. Many of ours are too. A certain amount of skepticism is good, as it can save us from being duped or misled. But we can become so skeptical of things that it erodes our ability to trust anything we see or hear. Skepticism can actually be a well-disguised defense mechanism that we use to prevent us from being hurt or perceived as a fool. Having too much ego protection is a real risk. Thomas, because of the boulder blocking his vision, could not even trust the word of his friends.

Boulders are hard to move. It's difficult to seek change or take a risk, especially when we are so afraid to be vulnerable or reluctant to trust another's word. When we are closed minded, overly pragmatic, unwilling to see things in a different way, stubborn or defensive, it is difficult to be surprised by God and stretched. We need to be less guarded, self-assured, and self-absorbed. God cannot break into the ordinary moments of our lives

and inspire us when we cling to doubt. If we are going to discover resurrection faith, we have to believe that what the witnesses say is true, especially when they are credible. We also have to trust that the risen Christ is alive in us, too!

While the first witnesses to the resurrection have faded into history, there are many others who have come after them. They continue to inspire by walking the talk of faith. They are the martyrs who offer their lives for the Gospel, the simple holy people in our communities who cling so steadfastly to their faith, those who have touched despair and found new hope and the ones who, even in spite of ridicule, still pursue their hunger and thirst for God. They are our friends, acquaintances, biblical heroes, and saints, and many others who are convinced that they have seen the Lord! The risen Christ may not surprise us with the same kind of visit as he did the first disciples, but God finds other ways. All we have to do is open our eyes, remove whatever is preventing us from seeing and believing and exclaim: "My Lord and my God!"

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THE WORLD IS WATCHING

If you're a parent, you know this to be true: the world is watching. All it takes is one slip-up — one bad word, one selfish action, one uncharitable commentary, and that's the thing your child seems to notice.

When he or she calls you on it, the only thing you can do is come clean. "Yep, I did that," you have to say. "I'm a work in progress, but luckily, God never stops working."

I think it's fair to say that we don't think enough about the wounds of Christ. It's a little understandable, of course. Our human bodies flinch at the sight of such pain and mortification. It's a lot to handle, the physical trauma of a crucifixion. It carries an R rating in a PG world. But the wounds of Christ are the only thing that could make Thomas believe. Literally nothing else was so powerful, not even the testimony of his most trusted friends. Only by looking at and feeling the torn flesh — by beholding that messy reality — did this Apostle, this actual companion of Christ, come to believe in the Resurrection.

"Christ has no body now but yours," goes the famous quote attributed to St. Teresa of Avila. What she's saying is that we have become the means through which God chooses to accomplish His will in the world. Us, the broken. Us, the weary. Us, the imperfect. Yes, miraculous events and apparitions still occur from time to time, but by and large, if a person is going to come to believe in Jesus Christ in this day and age, it will be because of something we Christians do or say.

Christ has no wounds now but ours. Our brokenness, our weariness, our imperfection — our reality. It all belongs to him, and the world is watching. — Tracy Earl Welliver, MTS



ORIGIN OF DIVINE MERCY SUNDAY

Mankind's need for the message of Divine Mercy took on dire urgency in the 20th Century, when civilization began to experience an "eclipse of the sense of God" and, therefore to lose the understanding of the sanctity and inherent dignity of human life. In the 1930s, Jesus chose a humble Polish nun, St. Maria Faustina Kowalska, to receive private revelations concerning Divine Mercy that were recorded in her Diary. St. John Paul II explains:

This was precisely the time when those ideologies of evil, nazism and communism, were taking shape. Sister Faustina became the herald of

the one message capable of offsetting the evil of those ideologies, that fact that God is mercy—the truth of the merciful Christ. And for this reason, when I was called to the See of Peter, I felt impelled to pass on those experiences of a fellow Pole that deserve a place in the treasury of the universal Church.

Divine Mercy Sunday

St. Faustina's Diary records 14 occasions when Jesus requested that a Feast of Mercy (Divine Mercy Sunday) be observed, for example:

My daughter, tell the whole world about My inconceivable mercy. I desire that the Feast of Mercy be a refuge and shelter for all souls, and especially for poor sinners. On that day the very depths of My tender mercy are open. I pour out a whole ocean of graces upon those souls who approach the Fount of My mercy. The soul that will go to Confession and receive Holy Communion shall obtain complete forgiveness of sins and punishment. ... Let no soul fear to draw near to Me. ... It is My desire that it be solemnly celebrated on the first Sunday after Easter. Mankind will not have peace until it turns to the Fount of My Mercy.

—St. Faustina, Diary, no. 699

On May 5, 2000, five days after the canonization of St. Faustina, the Vatican decreed that the Second Sunday of Easter would henceforth be known as Divine Mercy Sunday.

QUESTIONS OF THE WEEK

First Reading

La Liturgia de este II Domingo de Pascua celebra el Domingo de la Misericordia. El Evangelio nos dice que ocho días después se les apareció Jesús. Bridándoles su paz entonces y ahora a nosotros. Esa paz que no se va, la que se queda en el corazón y se brinda a los hermanos y hermanas que están a nuestro alrededor. "La paz este con ustedes!" (Juan 20:21). Esas hermosas palabras de Jesús hacen eco en nuestro mundo, roto por el sufrimiento, en palabras del Papa Francisco en la actualidad.

"En el centro de este domingo, con el que se termina la octava de pascua, y que san Juan Pablo II quiso dedicar a la Divina Misericordia, están las llagas gloriosas de Cristo resucitado. Él ya las enseñó la primera vez que se apareció a los apóstoles la misma tarde del primer día de la semana, el día de la resurrección. Pero Tomás aquella tarde no estaba. Ocho días después, Jesús se apareció de nuevo en el cenáculo, en medio de los discípulos: Tomás también estaba; se dirigió a él y lo invitó a tocar sus llagas. Y entonces, aquel hombre sincero se arrodilló delante de Jesús y dijo: 'Señor mío y Dios mío'" (Juan 20:28). En el cuerpo de Cristo

resucitado las llagas permanecen, porque son el signo permanente del amor de Dios por nosotros, y son indispensables para creer que Dios es amor, misericordia, fidelidad". Sus heridas son medicina que nos curan (1 Pedro 2:24 ver Isaías 53:5). La misión de Cristo Resucitado continúa en mí. ¿Qué hago para llevarla a cabo?

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EL MUNDO ESTÁ OBSERVANDO

Si eres padre, sabes que esto es cierto: el mundo está observando. Todo lo que se necesita es un desliz: una mala palabra, una acción egoísta, un comentario poco caritativo, y eso es lo que tu hijo parece notar. Cuando él o ella te lo hace notar, lo único que puedes hacer es confesarlo. "Sí, hice eso," tienes que decir. "Soy un trabajo en progreso, pero afortunadamente, Dios nunca deja de trabajar."

Creo que es justo decir que no pensamos lo suficiente en las heridas de Cristo. Es un poco comprensible, por supuesto. Nuestros cuerpos humanos se estremecen al ver tanto dolor y mortificación. Es mucho para manejar, el trauma físico de una

crucifixión. Lleva una calificación R en un mundo PG.

Pero las heridas de Cristo son lo único que podía hacer creer a Tomás. Literalmente, nada más era tan poderoso, ni siquiera el testimonio de sus amigos de más confianza. Solo mirando y sintiendo la carne desgarrada, al contemplar esa realidad complicada, este Apóstol, este verdadero compañero de Cristo, llegó a creer en la Resurrección.

"Ahora, Cristo no tiene más cuerpo que el tuyo," dice la famosa cita atribuida a santa Teresa de Ávila. Lo que ella está diciendo es que nos hemos convertido en el medio a través del cual Dios elige para cumplir Su voluntad en el mundo. Nosotros, los rotos. Nosotros, los cansados. Nosotros, los imperfectos. Sí, eventos milagrosos y apariciones todavía ocurren de vez en cuando, pero en general, si una persona va a llegar a creer en Jesucristo en esta época, será por algo por lo que los cristianos hacemos o decimos.

Ahora, Cristo no tiene más heridas que las nuestras. Nuestro quebrantamiento, nuestro cansancio, nuestra imperfección, nuestra realidad. Todo le pertenece a él y el mundo está observando.

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ORIGEN DEL DOMINGO DE LA DIVINA MISERICORDIA

La necesidad de la humanidad del mensaje de la Divina Misericordia tomó una urgencia extrema en el siglo XX, cuando la civilización comenzó a experimentar un "eclipse del sentido de Dios" y, por lo tanto, a perder la comprensión de la santidad y la dignidad inherente de la vida humana. En la década de 1930, Jesús eligió a una humilde monja polaca, Santa María Faustina Kowalska, para recibir revelaciones privadas sobre la Divina Misericordia que fueron registradas en su Diario. San Juan Pablo II explica:

Este fue precisamente el momento en que esas ideologías del mal, el nazismo y el comunismo, estaban tomando forma. Sor Faustina se convirtió en la mensajera del único

mensaje capaz de contrarrestar el mal de esas ideologías, es el hecho de que Dios es misericordia--la verdad de Cristo misericordioso. Y por ese motivo, cuando fui llamado a la Sede de Pedro, me sentí impulsado a transmitir aquellas experiencias de la hermana polaca que merecen un lugar en el tesoro de la Iglesia universal.


Domingo de la Divina Misericordia

El Diario de Santa Faustina registra 14 ocasiones en las que Jesús pidió que se observara una Fiesta de la Misericordia (Domingo de la Divina Misericordia), por ejemplo, le dijo: Hija Mía, háblale al mundo entero de Mi inconcebible Misericordia. Deseo que la Fiesta de la Misericordia sea refugio y amparo para todas las almas, y especialmente para los pobres pecadores. En ese día las profundidades mismas de Mi tierna misericordia están abiertas, derramo todo un océano de gracia sobre aquellas almas que se acercan a la Fuente de Mi misericordia. El alma que se confiese y reciba la Sagrada Comunión obtendrá el completo perdón de los pecados y de las penas. ... Que ninguna alma tema acercarse a Mí. ... Es Mi deseo que se celebre solemnemente el primer domingo después de Pascua; la humanidad no tendrá paz hasta que vuelva a la Fuente de Mi Misericordia.

El 5 de mayo de 2000, cinco días después de la canonización de Santa Faustina, el Vaticano decretó que el Segundo Domingo de Pascua se conocería en adelante como Domingo de la Divina Misericordia.


